

LAMINITIS - PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN A CURE



Laminitis is an extremely painful condition affecting the feet of horses. The term laminitis refers to inflammation of the laminae. When inflamed, the laminae become painful and swollen and their ability to suspend the pedal bone within the hoof capsule becomes compromised which can result in sinking and rotation of the pedal bone. In severe cases the pedal bone may end up prolapsing through the sole of the foot.

WHAT CAN CAUSE LAMINITIS

- Endocrine (hormonal) conditions (Cushings disease and Equine Metabolic Syndrome)
- Massive carbohydrate overload
- Toxic insults (eg. Post colic surgery, colitis, retained placenta)
- Support limb laminitis

TREATMENT OF LAMINITIS

Generally, treatment of acute laminitis relies on box rest, anti-inflammatory and pain relieving drugs and adequate support of the feet. e.g frog supports or deep bedding.

X-ray are always recommended as part of the laminitis investigation.

Once the acute (sore) phase has passed, the vet will aim investigation to try and identify the underlying cause of the laminitis.

SYMPTOMS OF LAMINITIS

- Most commonly in the front feet however can be all 4, any individual or rarely the hind feet.
- Signs of pain, reluctance to move, facial tension, lack of interest in surroundings.
- Excessive heat in the feet.
- Strong digital pulse.
- Pain relieving stance e.g. leaning back on heels.
- Alternative lifting of the feet when resting (weight-shifting).
- A 'pottery' walk with the heel set down before the toe.
- Lameness exaggerated by turning on a hard surface.
- There are also many more symptoms so always call a vet if any of the above are displayed or you're concerned.





PREVENTION OF LAMINITIS

Prevention is most definitely better than a cure!

The most important factors are ensuring your horse is the correct weight, providing a suitable diet and maintaining adequate exercise.

COLIC

Colic is a condition that relates to pain in the abdomen (belly) and is something that most, if not all, horse owners have to contend with at some point. The word colic is derived from the word 'colon' which is a part of the intestines that all mammals have.


THE ANATOMY

Let's start by having a quick run down of the digestive tract of a horse.

The order is:

Mouth—Oesophagus— Stomach—Small intestine—Caecum—Large colon—Small colon—Rectum.

The horse's intestines are huge and can easily weigh 200-250kg. The biggest part is the large colon as this is where the horse ferments ingesta. Bacteria break down the grass and hay and produce nutrients and gas. It is this gas production that can be a problem in many colics.



WHY DO HORSES GET COLIC?

No one can ever fully answer this question but it often boils down to gastro-intestinal disturbance from management changes. For instance, problems can arise if gas production is excessive, such as when the grass suddenly grows or you change your horse's diet suddenly.

THE EXAMINATION

Ultimately, the vet needs to establish, does this horse have a 'medical' or 'surgical' colic? The parameters a vet would use to determine the seriousness of the colic are:

- ⇒ Heart rate as pain increases, adrenaline is released. This not only slows the gut but increases the heart rate.
- ⇒ Mucus membrane colour and refill time the vet will look at your horse's gums and press them to blanch them to see how quickly the blood flows back into the area again. The colour is also important. A horse that has devitalised bowel (a piece that is dying due to losing it's blood supply) will often show dark red or purple mucus membranes.
- Rectal temperature can increase a little with stress/pain but a big increase suggests the horse has a 'whole body' illness, and colic may only be the tip of the iceberg.
- ⇒ Gut sounds the vet will listen to the abdomen in four general areas. Upper flank and lower flank all relate to a different piece or area of intestine. The presence of gut noise is often a good thing but a horse with little to no gut noise is a concern.
- Rectal exam probably the most important diagnostic tool when dealing with a horse with colic, but there are limitations. The vet will palpate via the rectum for any abnormalities. A limitation of the exam is that only a small portion of the abdomen can be palpated. The problem with the rectal exam is that the horse is so large and a vet's arm is so short. There is a lot of abdomen that cannot be examined per rectum.
- ⇒ Pass a stomach tube As horses cannot vomit, a tube is passed into the stomach to see if there is a build-up of fluid that cannot pass. This suggests a blockage or twist. If the vet discovers a large colon impaction, fluids are given through the tube to help clear the impaction. So passing the tube is both diagnostic and therapeutic.

Excessive gas Pain Gut slow Adrenaline release

AVOIDING AND MANAGING COLIC:

- Change diet slowly over a 7-10 day period.
- Keep up with your horse's worming 80% of spasmodic colic is caused by tapeworms.
- If your horse has colic take away ALL food and call vet immediately for advice.
- Walk your horse with colic but not to the point of exhaustion.
- A horse with colic can lie down as long as there is no rolling.
